### Pastor Glen

If God raised Jesus from the dead and no one saw it, did it really happen?



I don't mean to be glib about such an important thing, but it is a real question that gets at the heart of faith. For in truth, no one saw the resurrection. Just the aftermath. Just the empty tomb.

In fact, the Roman authorities used the lack of eyewitnesses to the actual act of resurrection to try to convince the world that the apostles were lying. (Matthew 28:11-15) Obviously that didn't work as well as they hoped. And do not forget: the first (and only?) ones to find the empty tomb were women, whose testimony was as often disregarded, as it is today.

Yet somehow they believed. Many came to believe. Despite not having seen the event itself, despite the very small number of people who were blessed to see Jesus after the resurrection, many more came to believe. And for 2000 years now, many believe what we can barely comprehend, without tangible evidence or personal confirmation.

All of which is to suggest two things: first, it must have happened, and second, it doesn't have to be seen to be.

If we celebrate Easter and there is no one to see it, will it really happen?

As the entire world moves toward social distancing and personal isolation, the community that we call the church comes into a time of great peril. We cannot come together for corporate worship. We cannot gather for Bible study or fellowship or mutual encouragement. How then can we continue to be a church?

It is a more defined version of the shadow that has been looming over us for some time now. As attendance in churches continues to decline, as resources become scarce and new generations slip away, we worry that the church will disappear from a very different kind of social isolation. Traditions that we grew up on are losing their value. Institutions that we thought defined society are crumbling. The world swirls about us in a great dance of constant change, and we are at a loss to keep up. There is a constant and imminent threat to what we hold most dear.

And if the church meets and there is no one there to join it, will there still be faith?

Of course there will.

This moment in history that threatens to be our undoing may well be a great benefit. For too long we have defined church as a building, as a liturgy, as well-known hymns and an assortment of customary and much-loved events. For too long we have invested our treasures and our hearts into the church of our own creation, often to the neglect of the one of Christ's making. And there is no better motivation to rebuild and renew something than to witness its demise.

At this writing in mid-March, we are not able to gather in our usual ways, and we have no idea when we will be able to again. In the weeks to come, moments of community will be scarce, opportunities to support and serve one another will be scattered. We have work-arounds, of course, and we will make the most of them. Online, livestreaming, conference calling – we will use these to our utmost advantage. For some, the idea of an online gathering will be strange. (No more so than preaching to an empty sanctuary and a camera!) Some of us have avoided and even rejected social media instruments like Facebook. Some of us are going to have to get over that. Some of us do not have access to the technology that we really need now. Some of us are going to need help, and others of us are going to need to help them.

One way or another, this year we are going to celebrate Easter like we never have before.

All of these tools are only about replacing, to the best of our ability, much needed elements of worship and kinship. The real work ahead of us now is to redefine what a church is. Or rather, what church is. Because church is not a noun, not an institution, not a place or an event. Church is a verb, an act, a doing that brings light into the darkness of the world and opens the door for the Kingdom of God.

Too often we are only church for 60 minutes on Sunday morning. Now that we can hardly do that, perhaps we can fix our vision on being church for the other 167 hours of the week.

This is a new day for us all. It is strange and hard and fearful and tragic and sad. It is also a huge challenge for a Pastor who was not trained nor prepared to do ministry like this. But faith demands that we be hopeful, because only if we are open to this day can we hear the Spirit speaking. I cannot doubt that God is here somewhere like a tiny spark of light in the darkness. Even if I can't see it now.

Join me as we search him out.

### Opportunity to Serve

**Even** though we are not going to be together in our church building on Easter Sunday this year, we want to do our best to share together as we celebrate the Resurrection. To do this well, we need to get communion supplies and Easter Lilies into people's hands. There are two opportunities for you to help:

- ♦ We need a few people to be at the church during scheduled times so that people can come and pick up the supplies they need for Easter Sunday. You can pick your hours / days from April 7th through 11th. YOU MUST BE FREE OF ANY SYMPTOMS OF THE VIRUS AND REASONABLY SURE YOU HAVE NOT COME INTO CONTACT WITH ANYONE WHO MIGHT BE CONTAGIOUS. There will be other safety precautions that you will have to observe. For social distancing reasons, we will not schedule more than two or three people to work at a time.
- ♦ We need volunteers to deliver communion supplies and lilies to members who are not able to leave their houses. These deliveries should also happen between April 7th and 11th. Same rules and safety precautions will apply.
- ♦ Not on this list but an idea for you to consider. Doing online worship only reaches people who have the ability to be online. Perhaps you know of someone who needs a little help with the technology to find the facebook page or website, for example. Reach out and see if you can help!

**On** Facebook, I can "follow" as many people as I want, viewing their messages, photos and activities. But I can choose only 30 to "see first" — that is, to prioritize in my news feed. As of this writing (Facebook changes often), if my "see first" list is full and I want to add someone new, I must "unprioritize" someone else.


That leads me to ponder bigger matters: I often claim to follow Jesus, but what might I need to "unprioritize" to make him not just a priority but the priority in my life? To what do I devote time and attention but ought to let go to follow Christ more closely? What activities, behaviors and values do I need to not just bump from my "see first" list but "unfollow" or "block" entirely? Perhaps they are antithetical to discipleship or simply take too much time away from prayer, Scripture and service.

This dilemma isn't unique to the digital age. Facebook parlance is about what we "see first," but in Matthew 6:33 Jesus says, "Seek first the kingdom of God and his righteousness" (ESV, italics added).

### **Easter Traditions**

Easter traditions are important, but they vary widely. While Americans dye hardboiled eggs, Kenyans carve soapstone eggs and present them as gifts in banana-fiber boxes. In Bermuda, locals fly homemade kites on Good Friday — a tradition that began when a teacher illustrated Christ's ascension to heaven using a cross-shaped kite.

Ethiopian Christians observe a 56-day fast from meat and all animal products. On Easter, they dress in white to worship in churches decorated with handmade fabric. Then they feast with non-Christians on roast chicken, goat and rice.

In France, church bells are silent between Holy Thursday and Easter to observe Jesus' Passion. According to legend, the bells grow wings and fly to Rome to be blessed, returning on Easter with chocolate and presents. In one town's main square, chefs make a giant omelet with 4,500 eggs to feed 1,000 people!
