The fact that we die is the most important fact about us. -- Todd May, <u>Death</u>



The trees are barren, the grass brown, the sky dim and dreary. Chill winds blow about and the detritus of winter is piled against the curb. Dry dead leaves flutter across the ground. The air is mild in comparison to recent winter days, but the sun is dim, feeble, ineffectual.

It is great irony that a church season named after the Latin word for Spring comes during the bleakest, gloomiest month of the year. But it is, after all, a season about death.

In Biblical times, sorrow and mourning were demonstrated by heaping ashes on the head. On Ash Wednesday we smear ashes on our forehead as a reminder of our roots and our mortality. We were formed from the dust of the earth, and there we will return at the end of our appointed days. Surely that is bad news.

Or is it good?

The gospel is fixated with death. When Jesus speaks of the future he portrays suffering and destruction, a tearing down of the temple stone by stone, of wars and earthquakes and famines. Of woman weeping and wailing, of persecution and betrayal and sacrilege. Of endings. Of death. The New Testament ends with images of vast violence and suffering.

And, of course, the fulfillment of Jesus' incarnation is death. Dying on the cross is his supreme work, his surrender both to the will of his (and our) Father and the necessary culmination of his mission. He came to die for us, we say, not realizing that this is our own end. For as Jesus goes, so too we must follow. We are called to take up our own cross and surrender to the truth that never-ending self-achievement is not why we are here. The will of the Father is our end, and the complete capitulation to death is its path.

Maybe that's why we invented Lent.

Lent is a season to reflect on the hold that death has over us, to confront the reality of death and our persistent fear of it. To look death in the eye and laugh. Yes, we will not keep this life forever. We practice religion

as a tool to help us escape death, but faith tells us that the gift of grace is truth. The truth that this life, this world, will end. The truth that we will end.

As it should be so. In sin we cling to this corrupt and dying world, to our broken and feeble selves. With fear and trembling we hide from death, we prolong the quantity of life with no regard to its quality. To what end? What of this corrupt and tragic life is worthy of eternity? Nothing! How surprising then, that God should choose to be a part of this life, this world, this us. How surprising that his Spirit should live in this place, and that salvation should come in this time, and not merely in the next.

Salvation is the promise that this is not all of us, that death is not the end of us. Salvation is not merely the promise of life after death, it is the hope of life before it. Salvation is what comes when we see death for what it is, and in turn, see life for what it can be.

This is the great gift of death, it has power to refocus our attention and give life meaning. To give this life meaning and urgency. Our effort to avoid death averts our gaze from the path before us and the important work at hand. We are, in fact, alive now. Knowing the end sharpens our vision of the present. When we stop wondering what will happen next, we are free to attend to what is happening now.

And that is how we laugh at death.

Death has power over us because we let it, because we obsess about it and – mostly! – because we are afraid of it. Why should we be afraid of the one most common experience of humanity? Everything we do embraces death, gives death power over us. We are surely and truly dead. But everything that denies death, every act and word that embraces love and hope in the face of our mortality spits in death's eye. Every good work and kind act defies the power of death over us and our world.

And wouldn't you rather live?

This Lent, let us think and pray and worship and act in ways that mock death and free us from its hold. This Lent, let us who are dying live.

What is the purpose of our worship gatherings, except to confess our fear of death and be filled with the Spirit of Life? This Lent, we will ponder our mortality with honesty and courage, and knowing the truth of both life and death, we will choose life.

February 26th - Ash Wednesday

We place ashes on our forehead as a reminder that we are mortal, but as we do so, we mock the power of death to control us and shape our destiny. Somewhere in between our creation from dust and our return to it, is a life that we can and must live.

March 1st

We battle against the Devil's temptations daily, and not always successfully. We know that Christ joins in our struggle to throw off the Devil's lies. In baptism we are empowered to be more than we seem to be. Feeble dying creatures that we are, the Spirit encourages us in our struggle.

March 8th

Our fear of death persuades us to seek security and comfort and to avoid risk. God calls us to journey to places unknown and to trust in a Spirit that we cannot control. Faith opens us up to the possibilities of life that comes from following where we are led and going where we are called.

March 15th

We construct walls to protect us from the truth. We invent stories and identities to hide behind, to deflect hard questions and keep us safe. Or at least we think so. Jesus exposes the truth of us and invites us to a life filled with mission and hope.

March 22nd

Our need for control blinds to the possibilities of grace. We say we desire a God of miracles, but do not stop to consider the awesome possibilities of what an all-powerful God might actually do. Jesus comes to open our eyes to see what truly is, not to validate our human preconceptions.

March 29th

Overwhelmed by this dying world, we sometimes find ourselves entombed in misery and despair. It is hard to see past our grief and pain. God breathes life into our dying bones and Jesus calls us forth from the tomb into the light of day.

April 5th – Palm Sunday

Jesus bring in the future as he rides into Jerusalem. His presence is a threat to the established powers of the world and to the established powers of us. The path toward the triumph of the Kingdom of God leads to the cross, and we must follow.

April 9th – Maundy Thursday

As we join with Jesus in his last supper, he challenges us to a deep and intimate relationship. He washes our feet, he gives us his own body and blood to eat and drink. Our reticence must be swept away so that we can enter into a deeper relationship with our Savior.

April 10th - Good Friday

We follow Christ in our own version of the Walk of Sorrows to face our own death and give ourselves fully to God.

April 12th – Easter Sunday
