REFLECTIONS

Scorching summer days make it easy to understand why the church has usually portrayed hell as "the hot place." It's torturous! Personally, I have always disliked the cold more than the heat, but as the years pass I find it more and more difficult to tolerate the heat. It has a way of sucking the life and energy out of you, and if that isn't the definition of hell then I'm not sure what is.

Of course, it's not the heat that is making people think about the end of the world. It's the other stuff (i.e., the raging violence, increasing economic hardship and poverty, rampant diseases and human suffering, endless brokenness in human relationships, tempestuous changes in the climate, etc.). I have come to wonder though, if our vision of the end of the world is really just wishful thinking. At some point we all ponder how much more of this we can take. Given how futile our efforts to fix the problems of life seem to be, perhaps it would be nice if God would just "wrap the whole thing up.

We're tired—that's understandable—and it's not like this is the first time things have been bad. There have been pandemics before. There are some among us who have lived through global financial crisis and worldwide war. Maybe the problem is not so much that bad things are happening, as it is that they are still bad. Will we ever learn the mistakes of the past and change?

Will it ever get better?

That is the right question. That is a very faith-filled question because the Word of God tells us that of course it will... just as soon as *we* do.

It needs to be said, perhaps over and over again, that the challenges of our days are not the work of an angry, wrath-filled, judgmental God. That is not what the Bible tells us (though it is unfortunately what a lot of preachers with agendas have told us). Of course there is right and wrong. Of course it matters which we "choose." But nothing that we are experiencing is arbitrary or random. Our lives are cluttered with consequences of our own creation.

Which means that we can do something about it.

The ecology of our planet has been destroyed because we have

preferred comfort and profit over the responsibility to be stewards οf aood creation God has gifted us. There endless division is strife because and entitlement is part of culture. because we are comfortable with inequity. and because we are unwilling to do the hard work



of justice. There is violence because we attend our personal fears rather than the well-being of others. The church is dying because we have tied its fortunes to the values of this world and lost our holy purpose.

There is not one single thing in that previous paragraph that we cannot fix. There is not one single thing in that previous paragraph that the Holy Spirit cannot overcome.

Do you believe that?

Pessimism is easy. The industry of this world is fueled by it. There is a simple reason why bad news fills the media: We are more attentive to it, interested in it, and manipulated by it. Bad news is self-reinforcing. It excuses us from having either to care or do. Hope is much more difficult. It demands that we give everything we are and everything we have in order to move ourselves and our world closer and closer to the Kingdom of God. Hope is hard.

But hope is also sustaining.

In the end, our self-indulgent pessimism is its own hell. We do not need God to punish us for our shortcomings—we are more than capable of doing that work ourselves. Which is probably why God is much more interested in filling us with promise and possibility. God is constantly at the work of giving us gifts, and showing us visions, and leading us forward in grace, not merely for our own sake but ultimately for his. God did not give his own son that we should be tired or angry or hurt.

He gave us his son so that we should live. Forever and abundantly.

And we can do that.



A team of people from St. Matthew have been working with the Nebraska Synod for months now as part of the Vitality Initiative for congregations. The purpose of this project is to help us renew our missional perspective and revitalize our work.

The team is reaching the end of phase II of the project which involved getting to know more about the community around the church. The paragraph and word cloud below reflect what we learned. We would love to hear your reactions to these ideas. Please share your thoughts with Pastor Glen and he will pass them on to the team.

"Our conversations revealed to us the paradox of a neighborhood built to serve a world of traditional families and lifestyles that is now facing dramatic and seemingly constant change. Time-honored institutions and patterns that were established 70 years ago have been challenged by increasing diversity, growth, and stress. We heard a need for both the sociability and constancy that was originally built into in this neighborhood and for new tools to address a strange and uncertain future. There is a widely held belief that this is a friendly and welcoming neighborhood, but at the same time an awareness that demo-

araphic diversity. rising housing prices, strained social networks are creating difficult challenges for individuals. families, and the whole community. From these conversations we heard the calling for Saint Matthew to become an active participant in creating spaces and opportunities for people to gather and connect with one another and valuable new ways."
