### 🇞 Pastor Glen

Whatever gains I had, these I have come to regard as loss because of Christ. More than that, I regard everything as loss because of the surpassing value of knowing Christ Jesus my Lord. For his sake I have suffered the loss of all things, and I regard them as rubbish, in order that I may gain Christ and be found in him ... Philippians 3:7–9

It has been a year of great loss, literally and figuratively.

Well, not just a year but an era.

Certainly, in a very literal sense, the world has seen great loss through this time of pandemic. Millions have died from this dreadful virus, and our grave responsibility as those who believe in the sanctity of life is overwhelming. As Paul reminded us, in the body of Christ we suffer with those who suffer, we grieve with those who grieve. We should never pretend that that is not significant.

At the same time, we have undergone a tremendous loss of so many things. In two short generations we have watched the decline and demise of treasured institutions and social structures. We've been overwhelmed by change, and we do not know where to turn. Our ability to trust has taken a beating. Our hope has been eroded.

What do we do with this terrific sense of loss?

We give it to God.

Paul's words to the Philippians are impossible. More than just "looking for the silver lining," Paul is challenging the very nature of our faith. Our deep investment in the things of this world is a barrier to our complete attachment to Jesus in faith. It is more than just a matter of balancing the two. We are called to make a complete and total commitment to one at the loss of the other. No, I do not believe that Paul is telling us that there is nothing of value in this world. It is clear from his writings that discipleship is found in the daily vocations of life. We are sent into the world - into this world just as it is. Yet Paul is always making it clear that while we are in this world, we are not of this world. We belong to a different Kingdom. We belong to a greater Kingdom. We belong to the Kingdom of God.

And we cannot fully live in the Kingdom of God while we are holding on to this world with both hands.

We should not discard the things of this world lightly. Nor is all of the loss we have experienced good or godly. Who would worship such a god? Yet there is an opportunity now for us to take measure of what it is that we value the most. How important are the institutions and traditions of this world to us? Could we imagine surviving without them? Are we willing to forego all things for the sake of our faith in Jesus Christ?

The dramatic changes in the world in the past two generations, and particularly the challenges of the past two years, have brought out the worst in people, probably because we are so bad at dealing with loss. Anger is a normal part of grief, but too often it seems like it is the only part of our grief. Faith is the gift of the Holy Spirit that draws our attention away from this moment toward what lies ahead at the end of this journey. There is nothing in this world that can save us - not church, not tradition, not wealth or status, not privilege nor pain. Those are all things that we must in time discard.

The gift of the Holy Spirit is the power to let it all go. And prayer is the moment in which we do just that.

Placing all that we have (and all that we don't) in the hands of God is precisely what Paul means when he says to "suffer the loss of all things." By "all things" of course he means all that we are. in prayer we fully submit it to God. And in doing so, we are given the gift of Christ.

Office Administrator St. Matthew Lutheran Church



The Office Administrator provides clerical support to the pastoral staff, department and committee coordinators of church ministries and to the Congregational Council. The Office Administrator serves as the receptionist and coordinates the overall functions of the church office. The Office Administrator promotes a healthy spiritual and emotional atmosphere for the community through everyone he/she has contact with. The Office Administrator reports directly to the Church Pastor.

This position requires a high school diploma and experience and fluency in speaking, writing and reading English. The position requires good organizational and problem-solving skills, self-initiative, flexibility, and the ability to adapt to multiple tasks. Experience in reviewing, proofing, sorting and collating of information and documents for distribution is expected.

This position requires strong computer skills, including word processing, desktop publishing, PowerPoint, internet use and social media, as well as filing, a basic knowledge of bookkeeping, spreadsheets, and processing mail. Experience with Church Windows software for membership management is desired but will allow for training. This position requires confident personal and welcoming telephone skills. Experience working with copiers and folding machines is desired.

This job is 20 hours per week (4 hours per day, 5 days per week), with additional hours during holiday seasons, for funerals, and endof-the-year reporting. Work hours will be set with the supervisor to reflect consistent weekly hours of operation.

Full vaccination against the CoVid-19 virus is required for this position.

### At the Water's Edge Rabbi Danya Ruttenberg

Today we're going to spend a moment looking at the dramatic scene right before the crossing of the Red Sea. The Israelites have left Egypt in haste as the consequences of the tenth plague came down. They took their reparations. And they got out.

But then, of course, we know, power does not give up power so easily, and Pharaoh had a change of heart, decides to go recapture his workforce. So we've got the Red Sea ahead of us, the Egyptians advancing steadily behind us. And all is not chill with the Israelites.

### Read Exodus 14:10-14

As Pharaoh drew near, the Israelites caught sight of the Egyptians advancing upon them. Greatly frightened, the Israelites cried out to God. And they said to Moses, "Was it for want of graves in Egypt that you brought us to die in the wilderness? What have you done to us, taking us out of Egypt? Is this not the very thing we told you in Egypt, saying, 'Let us be, and we will serve the Egyptians, for it is better for us to serve the Egyptians than to die in the wilderness'?" But Moses said to the people, "Have no fear! Stand by, and witness the deliverance which God will work for you today; for the Egyptians whom you see today you will never see again. God will battle for you; you hold your peace!" Then God said to Moses, "Why do you cry out to Me? Tell the Israelites to go forward. And you lift up your rod and hold out your arm over the sea and split it, so that the Israelites may march into the sea on dry ground.

Rabbi Lew described this as a general way that we can all respond to situations when we feel trapped–proverbial chariots coming one way and nowhere to move forward:

"We find ourselves in a terrible dilemma and we are appropriately frightened. We know something must be done, but we have no idea what, and this terrifies us. So (1) we stop running away from our fear; (2) we collect ourselves, we stand still, we let go of our terror, and we allow the world to reconstitute itself. Then (3) we see our experience for what it really is; and (4) this brings us to a point of deep stillness. Only then does the next action—the necessary action—arise out of this stillness, and we move forward, not really acting ourselves but giving ourselves the action the moment requires."

(The seventh day of Passover is regarded by the Jewish tradition as the anniversary of the date when the Jews crossed the Red Sea)

Here's a beautiful poem by the wonderful Rabbi Rachel Barenblat from her powerful new book, <u>From Narrow Places: Liturgy, Poetry, and Art of the</u> <u>Pandemic Era</u>, and her poetry collections.

### Pantoum for the Seventh Day Rabbi Rachel Barenblat

Step into the water. You can't see the far shore. Is the foam rising, or receding? Take a deep breath and keep walking. You can't see the far shore. There's no knowing what's ahead. Take a deep breath and keep walking, Cultivating faith in your body. There's no knowing what's ahead. This is what the sages mean by "Cultivating faith in your body." Can you trust that you'll make it? This is what the sages mean by "The water is wide, I cannot get o'er." Can you trust that you'll make it? You're not crossing the sea alone. "The water is wide, I cannot get o'er." The only way out is through. You're not crossing the sea alone. Sing with me as we make our way. The only way out is through. Is the foam rising, or receding? Sing with me as we make our way. Step into the water.

Engage with these texts in any way you like, but here are some questions

- When have you been the Israelites, terrified to move forward? How did you find that will?
- Have you ever done something like what Rabbi Lew describes? What happened? Did it work?
- What's terrifying about taking that first step to cross the sea? What happens once you start walking?
- Have you ever started walking and regretted it? What happened then?
