Martin Luther was exuberant when he described the freedom of "a living, daring confidence in God's grace, so sure and certain that believers would stake their lives on it a thousand times." He once wrote, "Oh, it is a living, busy, active, mighty thing, this faith. It is impossible for it not to be doing good things unceasingly."

Faith convictions expressed as statements of belief flow from this confident trust in God. ELCA Lutherans share faith as expressed in the Apostles', Nicene and Athanasian Creeds, in the Lutheran confessional

writings (collected as the Book of Concord), and in the ELCA Confession of Faith.

At the same time faith does not close our minds to the world and our hearts to others. We continue to listen to the Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments. We listen to the witness of others and we watch for the ways God is active in the world around us. Faith opens a place for engaging others in conversation, for seeking the truth, for asking questions and speaking love in word and deed

Faith is a full life, liberated for a living, daring confidence in God's grace.

REFLECTIONS

You see it everywhere you go, on bumper stickers, on Facebook posts and political ads. The world needs Jesus. The world needs more Jesus. That, we are sure, is the solution to all our problems and the hope of making sense of this very messed up world.

That's true. Although maybe not in the way many people think.

Too often, sadly, Jesus is just a gimmick, a campaign, a public pretense hiding a private hypocrisy. It's nostalgia, a power trip, a cartoonish notion founded in a superficial reading of the Bible. Sometimes it's just a power trip disguised as religion. Sometimes it's just wishful thinking void of any actual meaning. Which is why it doesn't work.

There is a reason why "none of the above" is the fastest growing religious group in America. It has nothing to do with Jesus. It has everything to do with our unwillingness to follow Jesus as he actually lived and taught.

Yes, the world needs Jesus. The world needs us to BE Jesus.

So let's do that.

- 1. Let's be the Jesus who seeks out the lost, the least, the ones who need him the most. let us Fargo wealth and power and status in favor of the work of grace and compassion in the world.
- 2. Let's be the Jesus of radical forgiveness and reconciliation. Let us be the Jesus who puts people before principle, who enacts Godly justice as if our lives depended on it.
- 3. Let's be the Jesus who values the poor and forgotten and does no overlook the needy at our own gate. Let us not trust in our own comfort and security but be defined by the way we seek out and serve the least among us.
- 4. Let's be the Jesus of undiminished hope. Let us break free of the prison of this world's fear and nihilism and build a life on the promise of what God can create from even the smallest bit of faithfulness.
- 5. Let's be the healing Jesus, and let us be his healed people. Let us share open up the power of grace in this world to mend and make new, and let us lay aside our sufferings and troubles and live lives of gratitude and wholeness.

What if we change the way we do faith in the world, and instead of treating Jesus as a noun, a thing, an expectation or an aspiration we saw Jesus as a verb, an active presence in the world, a living? If we read the Bible, if we watched Jesus do and heard Jesus say, then we might be transformed in thought, word and deed. If we knew the real Jesus we could be the real Jesus, and that could change everything.

The problem is not that the world does not know Jesus. The problem is that the world knows a false Jesus, an image of human expectation and greed and desire, a sterile and empty Jesus who demands but does not give, who cares more about what might happen than what actually does, who protects institutions while people suffer, who is helpless before sin and doubt.

But we know a different Jesus, one who lives in both spirit and reality, who feeds and heals, who touches and blesses, who challenges and transforms. And we know this amazing baptismal promise: that Jesus lives on in us. We are his body, his light shines through us and words are realized in our very lives. We are the body of Christ in the world, and the world needs us to be that Jesus.

I asked you recently what you thought the community and the world needed most right now. Your answers mostly followed a simple refrain: compassion, love, acceptance. Just another way of saying that the world needs Jesus.

Now let us commit ourselves to being exactly that.

In July and August, the Vitality Initiative Project team asked the congregation to give responses to a series of questions to help us dream dreams for the ministry and mission of St. Matthew. We asked, "If you overheard someone talking about St. Matthew, what would you hope they would say?" and "What are your dreams for St. Matthew?" and "What do you think are the greatest needs in the community and the world around us?" Your responses looked like this:



I would like to remind you that before donating items out of your own personal pantry, please make sure that the expiration dates have not come due. We cannot give out food that has an expired shelf life. We also cannot give out items that have been opened or partially used.
