

That's a good thing! Seasons, traditions, decorations, holidays. These things are great. They shape identity, they deepen our roots, they add color and meaning to life. But symbols are only symbols, and it is way too easy to mistake symbols for what they represent. False devotion to symbols without actual attachment to what those symbols stand for gets us in trouble every time.

So we come to our annual celebration of the birth of this place we call home. Independence Day. The Fourth. We will be surrounded by the symbols of the day - stars and stripes, rocket's red glare, bombs bursting in sight. Hopefully some good barbeque. All the usual stuff that marks this annual observance. And will all of that make us more patriotic, or will it just make us feel more patriotic? That is not a question I can answer here.

However, it is a really fun and challenging question when we apply it to church.

Church is full of symbols too – liturgies, hymns, prayers, crosses, vestments. They matter too. They can center us, focus our attention, connect us to something much greater than us and the moment we occupy. But they can just as easily get in the way when they become an end in themselves, a barrier that keeps us from getting to the real stuff. And then instead of symbols or tools they become prison walls.


A lesson which we have learned the hard way in 2020.

You can hear it in the language we use. Can't go to church. The church is closed. There is no worship service today. We have deep, real feelings about this. We feel disconnected, abandoned, alone. Our routines have been disrupted and our spiritual life has disappeared. Our places are blockaded and so is our connection to God and Life and Hope and Joy.

You know that's wrong, right? You know there is more to church than place, more to worship than liturgy, more to community than coffee. More to hope than ... anything.

This is not a new truth. Reformations have been fought over it. The 16th century reformers tore down statues, burned artwork, smashed stained glass windows – not because they necessarily hated those things, but because those symbols had been held over their heads, used against the faith like weapons. They had been

Let's all say this: 2020 is not the year we lost it all. 2020 is the year we got it all back.

There will be in-person worship again, with all of the vestments and the hymns and the trimmings that we know and cherish. Not for all of us right away, but eventually, God willing, we will have the whole gang back together. As it should be. But as we look forward to that day, let's be clear and honest. If we think that will be the day when church starts again, we will have missed the whole and entire thing. And we will be less for it.

Church is not over, not closed, not done. And if we think that, even for an instant, then we are what is over, closed, done. If we are unable to worship God outside the walls of our church building, we are over. If we are unable to pray except by following appointed texts, then our hearts are closed. If we cannot sing out loud and well in our living room in our pajamas, then faith is done.

We can't do that. Especially now. The stressors of life are so immense now, the sickness widespread. The scab has been torn off of old, old wounds, and we are hemorrhaging life profusely. Complex problems that we have worked hard to suppress have broken free upon our hearts and into our world. We are in a dangerous place. We need faith now more than ever. And it must be actual faith, deep faith, true faith. We cannot afford anything less.

So this is my challenge to you. We are making plans now for a return to inperson worship. We have set a target date of August 2nd, pending a continued reduction of the spread of the virus. Not all will return then. Not all should! But if you have not found the Holy Spirit at work in your life in the last three months because you have not been in the church building, do yourself a favor: DO NOT COME BACK!

We are addicted to symbols. They are a comfort to us because they are easy, accessible. But they keep us from real faith, real questions, real growth. You know, hard stuff. Stuff that we need to do. And if you have not done that yet, if you have not spoken with God and experienced your calling and felt the Spirit without the symbols, then stay where you are. Let time do its magic. Wait on God. Be in the hard place and let it do its work.

You will be the better for it. We all will be.

And then we'll see you in church.

Update on Services



In Person Church Services?

The church council continues to carefully monitor the spread of the virus in the community and how it affects our planning going forward. While there has been some relaxing of the restrictions in some parts of the world, there is continued increase in others. We are well aware that worship services at churches carry a higher risk of spreading the infection. The Worship Ministry team has put together a very comprehensive checklist to help us prepare for a return to in-person gatherings that we will need to follow when we do gather in-person. At this time, the Council is working with a target date of August 2nd for possible return. They will review the situation again at the July Council meeting.

In the meantime, we pray that you will not forsake your spiritual life. There are many opportunities available, including Compline Prayers on Wednesday evenings at 8:00 pm. This brief prayer service happens on Zoom and includes a time of fellowship afterwards. The Thursday afternoon Bible Study is still meeting at 1:30 pm on Zoom. Pastor Glen is doing live personal reflections on the Facebook page every morning (Monday through Friday) at 8:00 am.

Not sure how to access any of that? Ask!

Sunday morning worship is posted on our website and Facebook page at 8:30 am and can be viewed any time afterwards. There is also coffee fellowship time on Zoom following the service (about 9:15 am.) Beginning soon, the worship service will actually be streaming live from the Sanctuary at 8:30 am!

As we prepare for the change in livestreaming and for a return to in-person gatherings, there will be training sessions for video technicians and ushers (and probably more). Please watch for information on training. If you are not currently serving as a worship assistant, we could surely use you!

The "Wow" Factor



After the final notes concluded at a recent symphony performance in Boston, the conductor hadn't yet lowered his baton when a child exclaimed, "Wow!" The break in protocol, magnified by excellent acoustics, didn't upset the participants or audience, however. Instead, several later said it brought them great joy. One even called the moment life-changing.

The incident was especially meaningful because the child, a 9-year-old named Ronan, has autism and is generally nonverbal. Music, his family says, tends to attract his interest and make him happy. When symphony officials learned Ronan's identity, they arranged a private performance so he could meet some musicians.

How often do you shout "Wow!" — in a good way — at what you see and hear? You may tend to do so on vacation or while observing God's natural wonders, but what about during your day-to-day life? Think about the people you encounter and their talents — and your own. When have these sparked a "Wow!" of thanks to God?

Every blessing, large or small, is a wow-moment — a gift from God that warrants our praise.

Fleeting and Forever

After conversing and eating with two followers heading to Emmaus (Luke 24), Jesus disappears from their midst. According to theologian Ronald Goetz, that vanishing has special meaning for followers of the resurrected Lord. "Human love ... is spontaneous, fragile and fleeting," he writes in *The Christian Century*. "Like the heavenly manna of the Exodus, love cannot be preserved and stored. We cannot manage it. We can only hope that it will be there for us when we most need it." Those aren't "melancholy thoughts," though, "any more than the two disciples should have lamented the vanishing of the risen Christ."

Goetz continues, "We know that Christ's vanishing and the vanishing of every human moment ... serve to underscore the utter preciousness of life." This, in turn, makes it a glorious mystery that the life we experience as fragile is, in fact, eternal.

Where there is need, God is always bringing new life, often working through the church but sometimes using Christians and others in the secular realm.

At England's University of Sheffield, scientists have learned to grow gardens from discarded mattresses in refugee camps. In Jordan and other dry regions, the foam "soil" soaked with a nutrient solution lets vegetables, fruits and herbs grow with far less water than usual. Syrian refugees who were already farmers "have made the project their own, growing things we never thought ... possible in the desert," says professor Tony Ryan.

But more than plants are flourishing! The greenery amid a barren landscape boosts mental health. The work experience will help people land jobs. Families learn new skills and eat more healthfully. And the gains go both ways, as scientists learn to apply research in the real world.

As God promises, "The wilderness and the dry land shall be glad; the desert ... shall blossom abundantly and rejoice with joy and singing" (Isaiah 35:1-2, ESV).
