I think people who work in IT have a standard response that they give without a second thought: "Did you reboot your computer?" I find it a funny thing about computers, that when they are not working correctly, all you have to do is turn it off and start again, and voila! — it's like the problem never happened.

If only that worked for everything else in life.

There are, in fact, numerous moments in my life where I simply wish I could go back in time and do them over. I am convinced that if I could change one decision, undo one mistake, my life could have turned out much differently. I am absolutely convinced that this is true. I know that some will say that every moment of our lives is important, that for good or bad they all lead to the person we become, the life we live. That it would be impossible to modify even the smallest thing without changing everything.

Would that be so bad?

In the midst of the Great 2020 Pandemic, there is a constant refrain of voices crying to go back to life as it was before this all began. That is a natural desire, a common experience. It is founded in grief and pain and formed in the illusion that this moment in history is just a blip, an oddity that when past will disappear like it never happened at all.

I am not sure it will.

But I don't believe it should.

The hard truth of life right now is that while no one is specifically responsible for causing or creating this tragedy, we are all responsible for its aftermath. Like every significant event, it ripped open the scars created by sins of pride, injustice, violence. We cannot hate what this pandemic has done to us without confessing what we have done to ourselves, to each other. We are not merely facing a global medical catastrophe, we are experiencing the fruits of our own labors, the works of our own hands. The list is long:

That we tolerate unsafe and unhealthy conditions for some workers That we underpay the actually important members of our economy

That we are overinvested in entertainment
That we are uninvested in family
That we do not really understand what it means to live in community
That we worship the false god of independence and individuality

All of these, and many more, are direct causes of our current misery. And our suffering is by no means mitigated by the truth that we have always been like this, that our world has always been like this. The only important question, the only thing within our control is this: does it have to be like this? Can't we change?

That would require us to go back to the beginning. Luckily, we can do that!

The story of faith begins with a family, a man named Abram and his wife Sarai. And God of course. In those first days God set forth a path of life for his chosen. He taught them, provided for them and protected them. He blessed them and directed them to be a blessing for future generations. In those first days, God revealed everything necessary for faith and life.

But we have come a long way since then, and along the way we got lost. We have forgotten what it was like at first, what it felt like to be called to faith, what God asked of his children and what he gave. The best thing we could do right now is return to those primary stories of faith and life and start again – not because all we have done would vanish, but that we might take an opportunity to move forward from this moment in a better way, as better people, for a better world.

Thomas Wolfe wrote that you couldn't go home again, that the mistakes and missteps which happened of life were simply too much to overcome. He must have not read his Luther. The great reformer taught us that baptism was not simply a one-and-done, but a touchstone that we could return to over and over and over again. As much as we needed. A daily new start. A reboot.

This summer, as (hopefully!) we take our first post-social-isolation steps, let us turn back to those early moments in our story. As we re-read and re-learn and re-see those days, let us seek the people we used to be, that we were meant to be, in trust and hope for whatever comes next.

When to Call the Pastor or Office

Your church staff wants to serve you, and it is our goal to do this as effectively and efficiently as possible. Most important to us is being available to you in times of sickness or trouble. Here is a partial list of occasions when you should call the pastor or the church office.

- IN CASE OF EMERGENCY this includes any life-threatening situation, serious injury or illness, especially when there is a death in the family or whenever it appears that the death of a member is imminent, or any other urgent family crisis or personal trauma. Your pastor should be notified immediately when a member has died; however, it is best if the pastor can be contacted before death occurs, when possible, so that he can minister to the dying person as well as to the family. In such a case, please call the pastor immediately day or night.
- Whenever you or someone in your family enters the hospital, or faces impending surgery.
- When you have suffered a loss in your life; such as the death of a loved one, an impending divorce, a miscarriage, unemployment or loss of a business, or lingering illness or injury.
- Four to six months or more before a wedding is anticipated and right away if a wedding is to be cancelled.
- When a baby is born or adopted, and when a baptism needs to be scheduled.
- When Holy Communion is desired by someone homebound or unable to attend Sunday worship.
- When you are troubled, struggling with a problem, or facing a major decision.
- When you have questions about Christian faith and life, the Bible or theology.
- When you are aware that a member needs help or is becoming inactive.
- When an unchurched neighbor moves into the community.
- When you are upset with the pastor or about something in the congregation.
- When something wonderful has happened to you!

> Update on Services


