

For the record, I was a good Boy Scout and I fully embraced the motto "Be Prepared." On my office wall hangs a framed piece of embroidery made by my mother with a picture of Noah's ark that reads, "Be prepared. It wasn't raining when Noah built the Ark." It may well be the most important lesson she taught me.

Not that I get it right all the time.

But that's not the point really. Once upon a time, in my life before seminary, I worked in the hotel business. As part of learning how to run banquets and other events, a manager taught me to create a well detailed plan ahead of time and, when the event began, to put the plan away in my desk (because nothing ever went as planned.) His point was simple – you can't adapt to unforeseen circumstances if you aren't prepared for the ones you can foresee.

It's the act of planning, not the plan, that matters. Life does not need to go as we expect it for us to need expectations. It's the mindset, the forward looking posture that brings us to life. It's hope, and hope only comes when your eyes and heart are open to what lies ahead.

Is this the great lesson of 2020? Not that we could necessarily have foreseen CoVid – but then again, there were some who did, and there were plans that had been made but were ignored, even discarded. And what level of obliviousness does it take to not foresee the consequences of centuries of unrepentant racism, the outcome of intentioned dishonesty and socially sanctioned selfishness and corruption? How could we have prepared for 2020? How could we not?

So now we come to Lent, 40 days set aside from our normal spiritual regimen (or lack thereof) in order to more fully prepare to hear and live out the most important story in our lives. In the world. To revisit the most important moment of faith and life, and to not emerge from Easter with hands as empty as the tomb. Which we will, unless we make use of this time to prepare.

What does that mean? Beyond the piety and the forbearance lies a much more important question: do you want to be ready? Do not be fooled – it is our nature to remain where and when and how we are, even if our present state is less that perfect. Change is hard, so we avoid it by not preparing for it.

But change is the whole point of Easter! Resurrection is an unadulterated transformation from death into life. It is not merely a thing that happened to Jesus a long time ago – it is our daily calling to follow the Spirit leading us to a new path, a journey of discipleship toward the Kingdom of God. To stay the same is to remain in the tomb, so afraid of what comes next that we refuse even the first step into the light of the next day.

How can you be prepared for something new if you don't believe anything new is ever going to happen?

We spend too much of Lent trying to make ourselves feel bad about things that happened in the past. The purpose of this season is to prepare us for the great thing that is about to happen next. We are called on a journey that leads to the world's Salvation. We need to be ready to leave the tomb when the stone is rolled away.

> Laud & Honor on Palm Sunday

The Palm Sunday anthem "All Glory Laud and Honor" is one of Christendom's oldest hymns. St. Theodulf of Orleans, who helped reform the church under Charlemagne, wrote the lyrics in the year 820 while imprisoned in France.

The lyrics recount Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem, an event the medieval church reenacted every Palm Sunday. Clergy and townspeople processed from fields through the city gates, behind a Jesus figure riding a donkey. At the gates, children began singing the hymn in Latin — *Gloria, laus et honor* — and onlookers soon chimed in.

City gates may be a thing of the past, as the website Hymnary.org notes, yet we still praise our blessed Redeemer "because we know just what kind of King he was and is — an everlasting King who reigns not just in Jerusalem but over the entire earth. What more could we do but praise him with glory, laud and honor."

All glory, laud and honor to you, Redeemer, King, to whom the lips of children made sweet hosannas ring. You are the King of Israel and David's royal Son, now in the Lord's name coming, the King and Blessed One.

& A Bountiful Life

"Life is given to you like a flat piece of land," said actress Jeanne Moreau. "I hope that when I'm finished, my piece of land will be a beautiful garden."

God, who put the first human in a garden to care for creation, blesses us with talents and resources to wisely manage. The Comfort Connection



Amid suffering, we might feel alone and wonder what good can come of it. But later we may discover ourselves equipped to serve precisely because of what we experienced.

Writer and civil rights activist James Baldwin stated: "You think your pain and heartbreak are unprecedented ... but then you read. [Books] taught me that the things that tormented me the most were the very things that connected me with all the people who were alive or who had ever been alive." Whether through books or direct human interaction, we often learn that our suffering connects us to other people and that our pain gains meaning by moving us to support someone else who's hurting.

Paul writes of such connection: "Praise be to ... the Father of compassion and the God of all comfort, who comforts us in all our troubles, so that we can comfort those in any trouble with the comfort we ourselves receive from God" (2 Corinthians 1:3-4, NIV). May you share the comfort you have received from God with others in pain. As a bonus, along the way you'll realize you're not — and never have been — alone.

God in My Hands



When I was ready to give up on the Church, it was the sacraments that pulled me back.

When my faith had become little more than an abstraction, a set of propositions to be affirmed or denied, the tangible, tactile nature of the sacraments invited me to touch, smell, taste, hear, and see God in the stuff of everyday life again. They got God out of my head and into my hands. They reminded me that Christianity isn't meant to simply be believed; it's meant to be lived, shared, eaten, spoken, and enacted in the presence of other people. They reminded me that, try as I may, I can't be a Christian on my own.
