We are enjoying some lovely fall days now, with cool nights and warm, sunny days. Well, except for one thing – the smoky haze in the sky.



Fires are burning on the west coast and creating tragedies in the lives of millions of people. At some level, it is just one more tragedy that is making this year what it is. At another, it is a perfect archetype of life in the 21st century.

It's easy for us to experience the fires as simply news, events that happen to other people far, far away. We could say the same of other natural disasters. It is our nature to be focused primarily on what is near us, within our reach, things that affect us directly. Even as the world gets smaller and we learn more and more about strange and far-away places, our devotion narrows. Instead of embracing what is strange and foreign, we retreat to what is comfortable and familiar. In the process we create a disconnect between ourself and our neighbor, and between us and our Savior.

Your name, O God, like your praise, reaches to the ends of the earth. Psalm 48:10.

The haze in the sky is the smoke reaching across 1500 miles to remind us that we are more connected to the rest of the world than we know. Or perhaps, more connected than we want to admit. The inconvenient truth is that while there have always been (and will probably always be) fires, this year's have been much worse because of the record setting drought, a product of the most significant human disaster of this age: climate change. You can add record numbers of hurricanes and tornadoes and any number of other weather disasters to the list.

And who's fault is that?

Ours. All of ours. Damaging the creation is not the work on any individual, it is the work of every individual, and its solution requires that we all work together to change behaviors and systems that are causing the problem. It requires us to hold ourselves and each other accountable, to name preserving our earth a common value and stop pretending that it's just a matter of individual choice.

And there it is. The great sin of the world today is Individualism. Not individuality, the gift of created

uniqueness that adds depth and diversity to our community. Individualism is the worship of self, the lie we tell ourselves that our actions don't affect others, that we owe nothing to anyone and that we are entitled to keep whatever is ours.

This is the sin that is tearing our world apart. And what does it say about our faith in the God of the entire creation? Are we the only objects of salvation, or is the Kingdom bigger than what meets our eyes? In the psalms, even the rocks and hills sing praise to God. Over and over again the prophets point to the day when all the nations will be redeemed by the hand of God. Often it seems like our vision of God is too small, too narrow, too personal. Consequently, so is our faith.

These are daunting times. We are confronted by overwhelming troubles, much of our own making. We are the ones destroying the creation. We are the ones (at least tacitly) preserving racism and bias in our society. We are the ones who turn off the TV when the news gets bad or give up social media when we are confronted with the responsibility to speak truth that might challenge relationships which we take for granted.

But the grace of God is bigger than this moment, bigger than our needs and bigger than our fears. We are waiting for all of this to go away, for these troubles to pass. But Jesus is beckoning us to the path of discipleship, where we are often overmatched by a hostile world, where powers and principalities threaten us. Yet, as Paul reminds us, even these cannot separate us from the love of God in Jesus Christ.

2020 has raised questions about us and our world and our priorities that hang over us like the smoke of a distant fire (to borrow the phrase), but although it beckons us to change much, it reminds us of what will never change. God is present with us in the difficult days, holding us up when we are in need, strengthening us for the work that lies ahead. May we be filled with his grace and wisdom.

> Loaves & Fishes Food Pantry



We served 10 families and 22 individuals in September We were blessed with being able to add a box of fresh produce to their pantry from our partners at Project Hope. They also received milk, cheese and 1/2 dozen eggs. We even surprised them with ice cream! It is always so fun to be able to add additional things to their orders without them knowing!

I would also like to extend gratitude to the women of the Jochebed Circle for their helping hands and green thumbs in planting and maintaining the garden located behind the Walnut House. Our guests have been able to enjoy fresh celery, tomatoes, peppers, onions, broccoli and green (although ours were purple) beans and squash throughout the summer. THANK YOU LADIES!!!!

We have some exciting things happening in the next couple of months. In October, guests will be registering for a Thanksgiving Meal basket that they will receive at the November pantry. Project Hope will again be providing the Turkeys and with the help of area churches and our very own, we will be able to provide all the fixings to go with it. Our church has been asked to collect 100 boxes of stuffing mix and 200 packets of turkey gravy. I know we are up for the challenge! Dave Sherwin and the Community Care committee will be announcing more details about this collection as to where and when you can drop off your donations. Stay tuned!

On November 13th the US Army National Guard has once again offered to hike for hunger and give their donations to our pantry! They will be hiking 14 miles with at least 30 pounds of food on their backs! Last year, you may recall they did this same hike which helped us reach our 500 items challenge from Thrivent. SSG Neil Wesley, assures me that they will have even more troops hiking this year!

I am planning on welcoming these men and women between 11:00am - 1:00pm in our parking lot and hope to offer them a boxed lunch. Anyone who would like to join me in welcoming them in and helping distribute meals is welcome! Masks will be required and social distancing will be practiced. If we have in-climate weather, we will move things into Fellowship Hall. Further restrictions may have to be implemented if we need to do this.

I am so excited for these opportunities to share with our community. THANK YOU in advance for your thoughtfulness and generosity in supporting these efforts!

On October 16-17th, Tanzanian Treasures, Fabric, and More are partnering with Fremont's Prairie Piecemaker Quilt Guild for Quilt Show/Covid Style.

St Matthew Lutheran Church will host a Mini Quilt Show and Sale from 9 to 5 both Friday and Saturday. You will be asked to wear a mask and social distance. Please enter by the main door on Walnut Street across from Belle Ryan Elementary School.

We will be featuring a display of 20 wall-hangings made of hand dyed fabrics by the ladies in MaMa Shoo's Co-op located at the foot of Mount Kilimanjaro in Moshi, Tanzanian, East Africa. You can see photos of many of these items on the website. We also have a two woman show of photos, quilts, and wall-hangings done by Tammy Ward and Mary Mayfield.

Many of these will be for sale as well with 50% of the purchase price going to the Tanzanian Women's Scholarship fund. Our shop will have a variety of fabrics from Tanzania, East Africa. There will be fat quarters, 1 yard cuts, and some larger pieces in commercial, hand dyed, and wax resist batik. These are made by Mama Shoo's Co-op, by individual artisans and some our students at the Angaza Women's Training Center.. Our merchandise is purchased in Tanzania and brought back by me and my friends as we visit our partner parishes in the Mount Kilimanjaro area.

We will have patterns, kits, artwork, photos, cards, jewelry, clothing, purses, baskets, and more. We prefer cash or checks...Thanks.

➢ Christian Symbol− The Plow

This farming implement is mentioned frequently in the Bible, often in verses about the harvest. Plowing symbolizes preparing the heart to receive God's truth, or the "seed" of God's word. The plow also represents commitment; Jesus says, "No one who puts a hand to the plow and looks back is fit for service in the kingdom of God" (Luke 9:62, NIV). The prophet Elisha burns his plow to show his commitment to answer God's call (see 1 Kings 19:21).


