ON the campus of Luther Seminary in St. Paul Minnesota stands a log structure known as Old Muskego, believed to be the first church building built by Norwegian immigrants in the United States. It was built in 1844 near Wind Lake, Wisconsin, and dedicated on Palm Sunday, March 13, 1845. It was used by the congregation for worship for 25 years, until a new church was built.

In 1904, the building was rediscovered, dismantled, and moved to the Seminary campus, where it was reconstructed and restored. It is now listed on the National Register of Historical places, and is used on the campus for special worship gatherings and occasional weddings.

But in the intervening years, the building was abandoned and used for various purposes, including, on one occasion, a pig sty.

You may find those last words troubling.

They don't bring me much joy either. I would hate to think of any of the churches that I have been a part of used for any other purpose, much less for housing animals. Churches are sacred places. We call our worship space the "sanctuary," from the latin *sanctuarium*, meaning a case for keeping holy things (holy people?). We call it the house of God, the most sacred place of all. We build churches to be great monuments to the faith, impressive objects of art that lend importance and permanence to our mission.

And then we keep the sacredness there.

That is our downfall. As the church building becomes more sacred, an object of worship unto itself, it becomes an end in itself, a barrier to faith rather than an instrument of grace. In the same way that we idolize the words of the Bible or our doctrine or our tradition or our history, we become imprisoned in this false definition of church, and the very creation of our faith becomes our prison. Because, of course, we are wrong.

The building is not the church. We are.

You know that. We all know that. So why don't we live like that?

When we believe that the building is the church, we treat it with respect and care. We attend to its maintenance, we invest in its well-being, we adorn it with our greatest treasures. But what if the church is not a building? What

if the church is you and me? Do we attend to it with the same level of care and hope?

I worry about that. Tending to the sacred space that is ourselves, doing the work of upkeep and occasional renovation is every bit as hard at taking care of a church building. And just as expensive! And certainly just as hard. But if each of us is the church, if the mission of God depends on how we take care of our faith, then there is no escape for the question: what kind of shape are we in? And are we doing enough to really take care of it?

In the same way that a building will not long survive without regular maintenance, upkeep and care, so too we quickly crumble into ruins if we forsake regular care of the precious gift of faith. Martin Luther knew this. He saw the church of his day attend to its buildings and institutions and doctrines but neglect of the people. There was no real investment in prayer, in the study of God's word and in the care of the neighbor. The church thought it had a strong structure. It fell apart, because it did not have strong people.

THE health of the church depends on the health of its people's faith. We cannot fulfill God's mission here if we neglect the practices that grow our faith. One important practice is prayer. We must regularly spend time in this sacred communion, opening ourselves up to experience the presence of Christ, silencing the noise of our daily lives so that we can be mindful of the Spirit that is the gift of our baptism.

During our midweek worship time this Lent, we will create a time of Centering Prayer. Using a simple melodic chant, we will seek to step aside from our self-centeredness and become centered instead on our spiritual calling. In the quiet of our evening prayer, we pray that God will fill us with strength and hope as we prepare to go into the world as Easter people.

Lenten Theme



THIS year in Lent, our theme will be **We Are Church**. We will focus on the aspects of church described in the Apostle’s Creed – we are One, Holy, Catholic and Apostolic – in hopes that it will inform the way that we live as the church in our daily lives. Then as we come together in our mid-week gatherings, we will do what the church does: we will pray.

Because when we pray, we are not just empty places, pig sties, but holy space, sacred space, fit for the Holy Spirit itself. When we pray, we are church.

Amen – may it be so.

Week One: We Are Church

The English word “church” comes to us from the Germanic “kirche,” which referred originally to things “belonging to the house of the Lord.” The Greek word often translated as “church” in the NRSV and other English translations, however, is ecclesia, a word which refers to a gathering or an assembly of people, and is related to the verb meaning “to be called.” Both of these meanings inform our English word, but one has tended to take prominence: the “church” as “place” or “building.” In response to that trend, it is critical for us to place emphasis on the “Biblical” origins of this phrase, and to think of the church primarily as an assembly of people.

Week Two: We Are One

In a world of increasing polarization both within and outside of the church, we confess with Christians throughout the centuries that we are one in Christ. This unity has not always been evident because of the visible divisions among Christians, but it nonetheless exists. Unity does not equal uniformity, and is not, in the end, established by us though we can work to make visible the unity we already share in Christ.

Week Three: We Are Holy

We believe that God has made us holy in Christ by the power of the Spirit. This does not mean, of course, that we never err as believers or as the church, but that we are regarded by God as holy for the sake of Christ, and that this knowledge frees us from the power of sin and the fear of the Law so that we can live for others. “Sinlessness” isn’t the whole story, however. “Holiness” also has to do with being set apart, with being called to a particular set of tasks or being used for a particular purpose. In this sense, we are decidedly a holy people.

Week Four: We Are Catholic

We are catholic because we belong to the whole church, and because we confess that the gospel of Jesus Christ is a universal message. When we say, “all are welcome,” we are making a statement about the catholicity of our congregations and of the gospel itself: that the gospel we proclaim is for everyone, and that all are invited to be part of the one church that exists in unity with Christ across the world. In a time when we are divided by so many things, this confession of the catholicity of the church represents both a promise and a challenge – a promise that God’s word is truly for everyone, and a challenge to make our communities places where all people can be themselves and find fellowship with one another and communion with the one Lord of creation.

Week Five: We Are Apostolic

We believe and confess that our teaching and preaching is a continuation of the preaching and teaching of those first twelve apostles themselves. We have received from them the testimony concerning Jesus, the sacraments of Holy Baptism and Holy Communion, the liturgy, prayers, and teaching, all aspects of our life together that transcend time and connect us with those saints who have gone before us. On the other hand, we also teach that the church is apostolic because we, like those first twelve apostles, are a “sent” people. We are given the task of proclaiming the good news of Jesus to all the world, baptizing, making disciples, and teaching.

Jazz Service



As we continue to grow the new Jazz service (3rd Sunday of the month at 10:30 a.m.) I wanted to share again these thoughts of how this particular form of music affects our worship life ...

ONE of the keys to Jazz is called “improvisation.” That is the part of the song where a soloist takes over and instead of playing the melody along with the rest of the band creates something bold and new, a spontaneous composition of notes and sounds that not only augments and highlights the previous music but adds new dimension and flavor. To ears that expect melody and nothing-but-melody, it might first come off as so much noise and confusion, a distraction from the harmony and structure of the song. But as you come to understand how Jazz works, you experience improvisation as an amazing opportunity.

These moments of improvisation have the power to go deeper into the music, to open up new ideas and break through text and tune and take the song to whole new places, to produce strong and amazing feelings. Great Jazz musicians don’t just teach us new songs, they teach us new things about songs and, in the process, about ourselves.

Which I think is pretty spiritual.

In our new Jazz format for the 10:30 worship service we are going to learn together a new way of experiencing music in church. Normally, we think of a song as just something to sing, until the melody and lyrics are used up and we begin another. At the Jazz service, you will watch and hear the musicians improvising with the songs, going new places with the music, and you are invited to go with them. You won’t have words to sing or melody to follow. Instead, you will have time and space to let the Spirit take you. Use those moments to reflect, to close your eyes and feel, to let God move you to a deep and powerful place of faith. Let yourself worship!


